**HOW THE PEACE OF GEO. HENRY CLACKER  
WAS DISTURBED BY IT.**

**The Attentions of a Professor to a Young  
Wife and the Sequel of Divorce—A May and  
December Union—Mrs. Steffen's Story of a  
Matrimonial Mistake—Matters in Litigation  
To-Day.**

George Henry Clacker has entered the divorce court with a petition against Julia C. Clacker. The parties reside in the South End, and the husband states that he is 53 years of age, while his wife, this being his second matrimonial venture, is scarcely 25.
